Our prayer for you is that you will find that rest.

Lament

The scene from the garden of Gethsemane is one of the most poignant and shocking in Scripture. Jesus is anxious, distraught and prostrate on the ground. It's clear he doesn't want to die and deal with what is in front of him.

Past struggles have helped prepare Jesus for this one; he has a pattern of turning to God when life begins to overwhelm him – Luke 5:16 tells us that Jesus often withdrew to pray – and now is no different.

In his deep pain and distress, Jesus cries out to God and begs that his death be avoided and for his circumstances to be changed. And in response to this desperate cry, God is seemingly silent at best, or at worst, says no – he will not change Jesus' circumstances.

And for all of us who have gone through times of tremendous pain and distress, times of God being silent and of saying no to our desperate longings, Jesus' prayer, as uncomfortable as it is, is also a deep source of comfort. Jesus' prayer, perhaps the most profound lament in all of Scripture thus far (and it will only ever be outweighed by the desperate cry of Jesus from the cross), serves as a model for expressing honest pain and desire, while at the same time making a commitment to accept whatever God brings.

This is a pattern of healthy lament; that we turn to God in our anguish and distress, we honestly share our deepest complaints and desires, we quite rightly petition him to bring change to the circumstances that grieve us, but then, despite the pain, we make a choice to trust in him for the outcome that he chooses.

We see this same pattern in any of the great psalms of lament:

How long, LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I wrestle with my thoughts and day after day have sorrow in my heart?

But here comes the turning point:

But I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation. I will sing the LORD's praise, for he has been good to me. (Selected verses from Psalm 13.)

The psalmist makes a choice to remember and trust that God is a good father and he is in control. In this, we are reminded that trust is always a choice for us too but is never something that just happens.

To trust is effortless when things and circumstances are easy, but it gets exponentially harder the tougher and more uncomfortable things become. Ultimately, we are choosing to trust in God's inherent goodness – no matter if good or bad happens to us.

The whole business of lamenting is itself an act of trust. How could we be so honest with God if we didn't believe he would love us unfailingly anyway? True lament demonstrates a bold faith that says, 'I'm in terrible pain, but I still choose to reach out for and trust in your love and your grace and your goodness.'

And as we do that, we hold on – sometimes by just a thread – to a good God. We hold on knowing that despite our circumstances, God is holding us. We hold on in the sure and certain hope that Christ himself is with us. Surely, these are sufficient for our praise?

We are so fortunate to live in the time beyond the cross – we know that the story of Jesus did not end there. Because of Resurrection Sunday, we know that silent or not, God held Jesus safe. And in that, we can know that God holds us in the silence too.

God holds us even if our circumstances make no sense and our despair is very great. And as we honestly lament before God, we can look ahead to a time when our pain will be resolved and our circumstances will be different. Ultimately, we can look ahead to that day when Jesus Christ will come again and we will know full and complete resolution of all that ails, distresses and confuses us. And in the hope we have for that, we can find healing, peace and joy now.
